Congratulations to all the above on their election. As far as I am aware, for the first time ever, there were more nominations for a committee position than number of positions vacant. What I found very encouraging re that, was the fact that the members nominating for a position were doing so, not because they thought the previous committee were not doing a good job, but because they just wanted to do something for the IBA.

That bodes well for the future of IBA.

I would like to add my thoughts here. I believe that we members have the right to expect that the new committee will do their utmost to ensure the continuing smooth running of our Association. I also believe that the new committee members have the right to expect that we members will do everything we can to assist them. We are a Club. We should all contribute.

Steve Hurley hand.

First of all, West does not have the CA and K otherwise you would have been doubled and they would have been played. So they are either split or sitting with East. The line of play is to run off your winners. Do the Diamonds first then the Hearts. This leaves the following position with the last Heart to be played:

S AJ
H 3
D -
C Q

S -
H -
D -
C J965

There are now several layouts that allow 12 tricks. If the Club honours are split, or the SQ is now singleton, it will fall. It is unlikely that the SQ is now singleton (given the lead and expected ability to keep a support card), so the best play should be for split Club honours.

Now play the last Heart. To protect the SQ, a club must be discarded. With three tricks to go, that will leave that defender with two Spades and the singleton Club honor.

Now exit the CQ. Whoever wins either gives you a (now known) finesse of the Spade. Or if the other defender wins, with the other high Club honor falling, you can finesse the ST.

So with a little application, the odds are good.

Page 1 Intermediate hand

West leads the ♣K against your 4♠ contract. Counting your losers, you see you have two

spades, no hearts, no diamonds and two clubs. Too many.

There is nothing that can be done about the two spade losers, so you have to get rid of one of the club losers. You have an extra heart winner in dummy opposite your singleton King, so you can discard one of your clubs on that. You'll have to do this before leading trumps, because the moment the opponents win a trump trick they will be able to cash two winning clubs.

Start by winning the Ace of Clubs and play a low heart to the King in your hand.

The challenge now is to get back to dummy to play your second heart winner and discard a losing club from your hand, without letting the opponents win a trick. To do this, you have to take two of your diamond winners, and then ruff your third diamond winner in dummy.

Now you can play dummy's Heart Ace and discard one of your clubs. After that, it is safe to lead trumps.
